June 10th 1904.

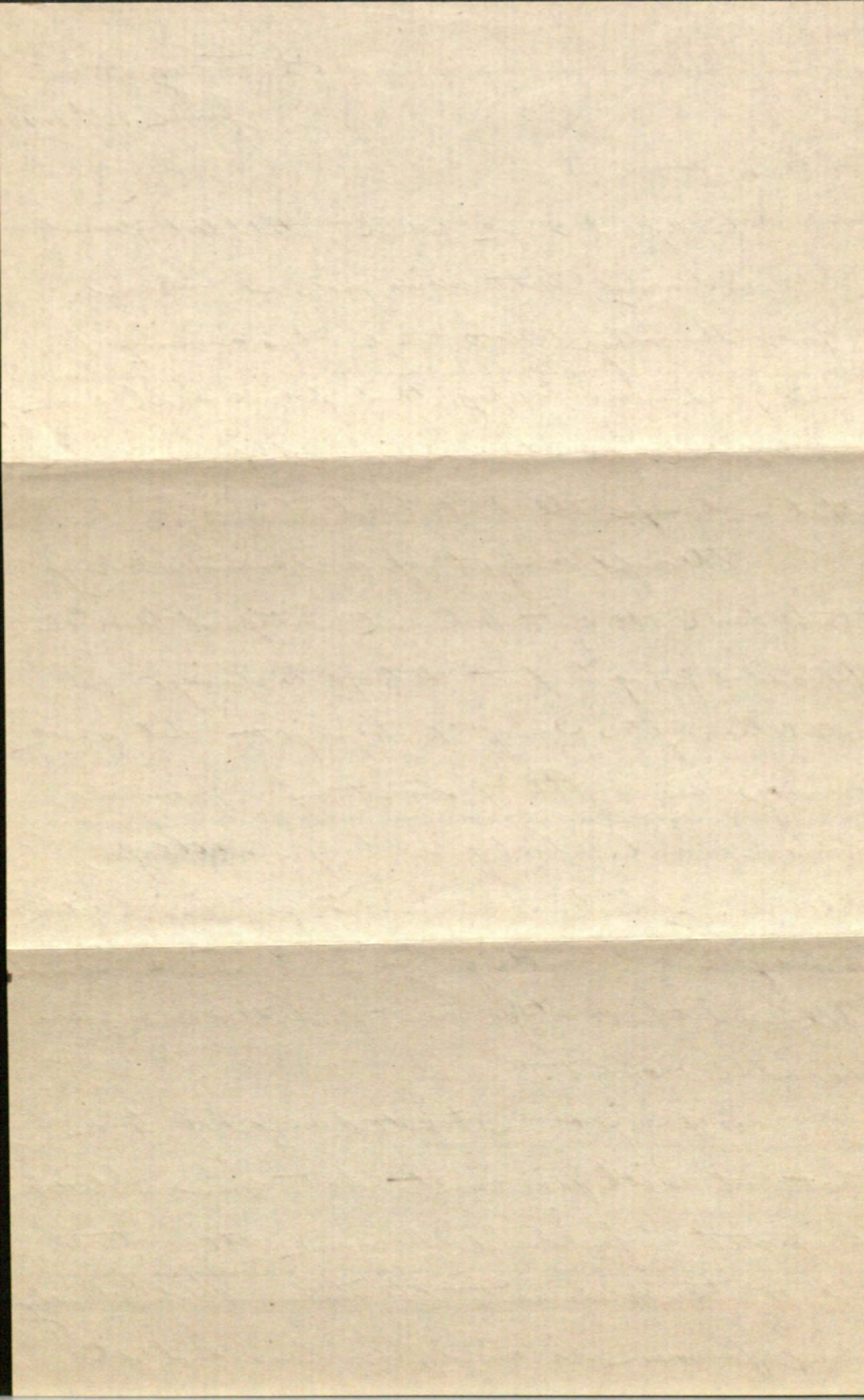
Dearest George,

an idle moment.

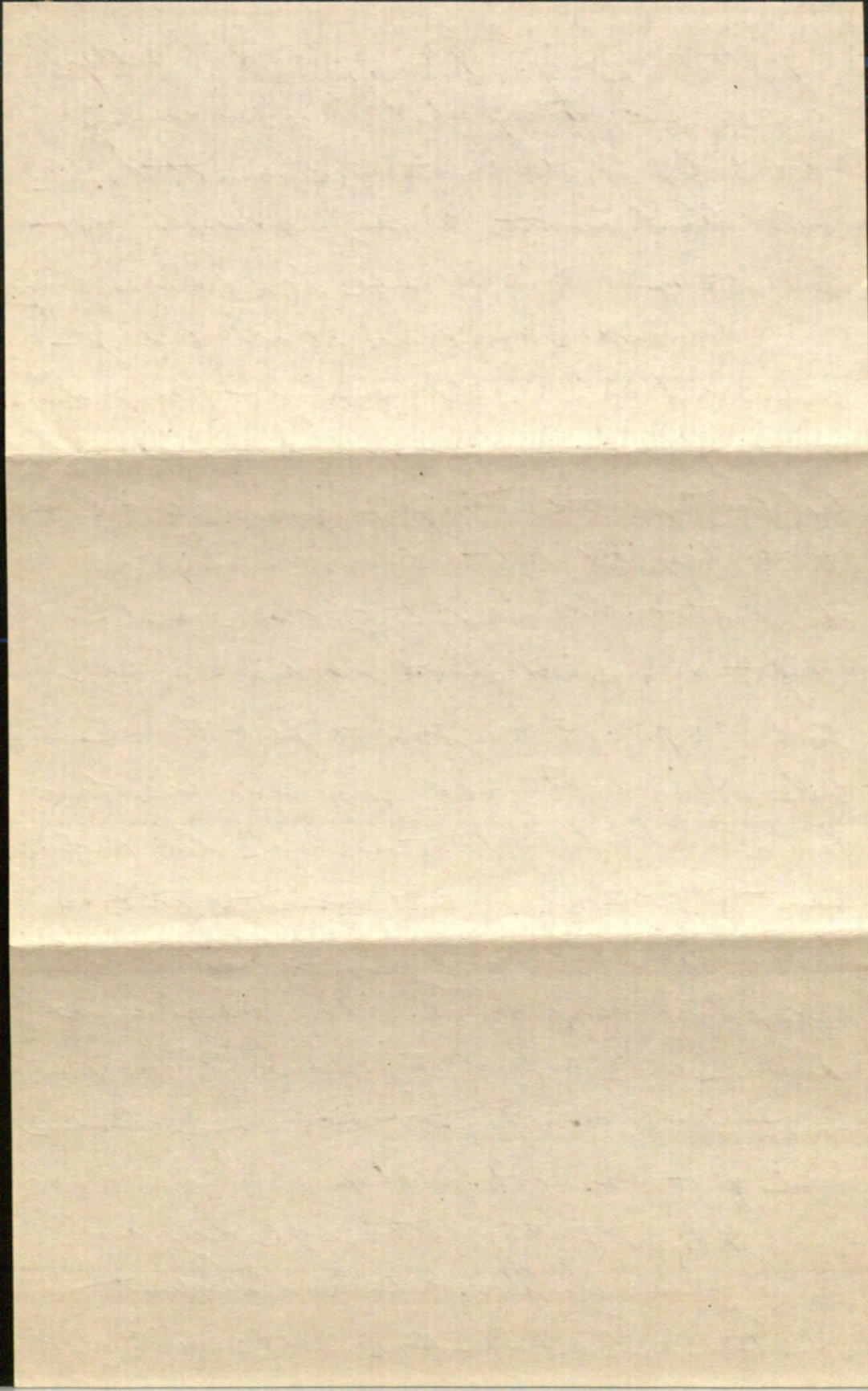
Last night, I treated myself to a

Pat is getting better each day and is very "lucky". Mr. Ashner did operate, I'm told, and all was done in the nick of



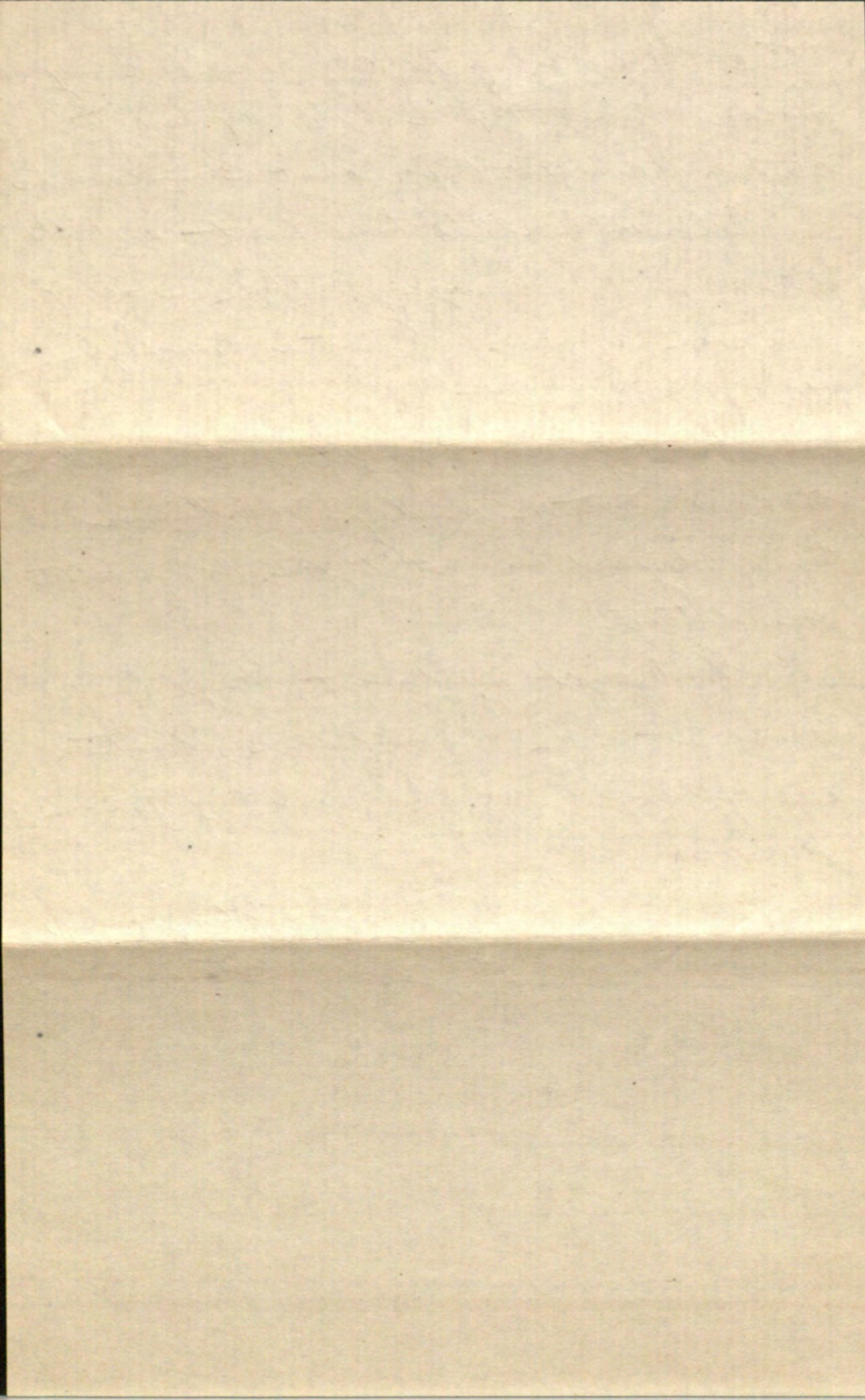
time. There's hoping he'll never have any serious ailment again. He may have to stay in the hospital for about 3 more weeks.
