Sept 8th 1863

Dear Sister Mary:

I sent you a letter
Saturday morning saying I should
write again and send you two
dollars I will enclose you \$2 which I
hope will arrive safely. Probably this is the
last letter for some time you will get
from me at 76 and it may be this will
arrive after you have left. In my
next letter shall send you some to Father \$5
shortly after will send the remaining \$5
making \$10. Which if he wants to use
he may have I want him to get some
clothes for himself and mother with it
Tell him not to say anything to Nell
or ~~anything~~ ^{one} else that it is coming then it
won't be so likely to be stolen or lost it
can't be helped. I would name the day I send
it but guess it is not best.

Write just as soon as you get this. What you hear from Frank B. and all the news. I have been waiting a long time for a letter from James he is awfully stuck about writing. if he can't write to me I won't to him that is all. Did you receive that letter of two big sheets written to James ^{at Mill Dale} but directed to Father?
