Travels to Canada in 1752

Capt Henry Stevens, Stevensville, Vermont, Vt.

April 27 1732 I set out from No. 4 for Canada
my son Samuel with me. Came two miles below fort
Sumner and lodged at Caleb How's.

28th Hired said How's with two horses for which I paid
two dollars. came to Deerfield and lodged at Ed. Hindsells

29th Went to Hatfield where I met with Mr. Wheelwright
and returned with him to Deerfield the same day. where
we remained preparing for our journey till

May 1st. Then set out and came as far as Taylors 12 miles. paid 1 Dollar

5th Came to fort Massachusetts accompanied by Capt. Moses Rice

6th. After making a present to the soldiers of 1 dollar. we set
out accompanied by Capt. Williams till noon. then took our
leave of him and came to Albany the same day. heard an
account of three soldiers being drowned in the morning
of said day belonging to the fort at Albany

7th We spent this day in visiting and consulting with some
of the chief men of the place how to proceed on our journey
to Canada

8th. We agreed with an Indian to assist us with his son on our
journey. and also engaged Mr. Sanders the Mayor of the city
to provide all things necessary for our journey

9th We sent a man to Schenectady to buy a canoe. for a suitable
one was not to be had in Albany

10th Lords day Excluding day Season

11th The two Indians came from Stockbridge in order to go
with us

12th Fixed our canoe and got all things in readiness for our journey

13th I set out from Albany with Heywood and Samuel &
the two Indians came with our canoe and loading sixteen
miles and lodged at Jacob Foots a Dutchman.

14th Hired the said Dutchman to carry our baggage in a
wagon to Stillwater. six miles. I with the two Indians
came up the Swift water in the canoe. then took the loading
and came to Saratoga and lodged. 24 miles this day.
Mr. Wheelwright came on horseback this day from Albany and
lodged at Saratoga

15th I came with the canoe 3 miles above Lydius and lodged
at the foot of the falls. Mr. Wheelwright lodged at Lydius
it rained at night

- Nov. 16th. Col. Lydies joined Mrs. Wheelwright, and met the canoe at the place where we take our departure from the Hudson River with five horses which assisted us in carrying our baggage. We came this day half way over the carrying place and lodged by the branch of Wood river. It rained hard at night.
- 17- We came to the Lake St. Sacrement (La Gorge) about noon with all our baggage. Col. Lydies with the two men with him turned back. After we had mended our canoe we embarked and came eight miles and encamped on the west side of the Lake. Showery weather.
- 18- Came over said Lake and lodged at the
- 19- Carried our baggage over said carrying place then embarked and came to the French settlements, three miles south of Crownpoint. Lodged in a French house a very stormy day. Wind at head and rain.
- 20- The storm continued at North east and rained. We came to Crownpoint at two o'clock P.M. The Commandant received us kindly.
- 21- It stormed and we remained at said fort.
- 22- The storm having abated we set off from the fort at six o'clock P.M. in a large batteau, accompanied by a French officer and five soldiers. Came about two miles and lodged on the east side of the Lake in a French house. M.B. The commander of the fort fitted us out with all things necessary for our journey.
- 23- Set out very early in the morning. Cloudy and some rain but not much wind. Came about thirty miles. The wind freshened up at North east. we put into the mouth of a river on the west side the Lake at which place there is a fine pine plain. After we had refreshed ourselves we embarked and came twelve miles and lodged on an Island.
- 24- Lord's day. The wind blew up at South. we hoisted sail at daylight. The wind continued in our favor till after noon which brought us within sight of fort Lemotte. Then the wind shifted into the North west. We then took down our sails and rowed till four o'clock P.M. which brought us to the South end

of the above said island in sight of a number of French houses. but the wind being so very high and having a large bay to cross we turned to the west shore. A little before night the wind fell and we crossed said bay three miles to a french house and lodged

25 Set forward early in the morning. came fifteen miles and stopped at a french house on the east side just above an island below said island it is called Chamble River here we refreshed ourselves &c. then embarked and came eighteen miles to St Johns fort immediately upon our arrival the officer of the fort sent an express to

26 about ten oclock in the morning the two carts came after dinner loaded our things into the carts and came off. The officer Mr Wheelwright & myself rode on horses sent for that purpose came to a little before night it rained the most of the way

27 A large batteau and a number of hands were made ready which brought us to Montreal. We arrived at the Governours about ten in the fore noon after he had received our passport letters &c we were taken to Madam Carre where we took up our lodging. then returned to the Governours and dined, after this we visited the commissary and several other Gentlemen

28 And so till the 30th. we spent in making the best inquiry we could. where our prisoners were

31- Sabbath day it rained at night
 came 1st We dined with the Governours and at night supped with an officer. This day a schooner arrived from Quebec and gave a hint as if she bring news of a large army being at go to Sebastopol and also that a mutiny had hapened among the soldiers at Quebec

2 Had the news of the Indians killing and taking our people

3 Dined with the commissary

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- June 4th Mr Longloose and his wife came to visit us
- 5 Nothing remarkable
- 6 Mr Wheelwright and I wrote a letter to Governor Phips and several other letters for New England
- 7 Sabbath day very hot weather
- 8 Mr Wheelwright went to Connewago with a number of French Gentlemen
- 9 Had father news of more mischief being done on our people and that three ~~of~~ prisoners were brought to Crownpoint
- 10 Paid a visit to the Governor who told us that he had no account of any prisoners being brought to Crownpoint. at night we supped at Mr. St this day three men and a woman a pass from the Governor and set out for New England. The men said they belonged to the province of Pennsylvania
- 11 Nothing remarkable
- 12 I visited this day was told by John Gurbles that the mischief the Indians had done on the English was at River and that there were six in company. two made their escape, two were killed and two taken prisoners. At night I was talking with a terrible
- 13 I kept house with the same distemper
- 14 Sabbath day, two small Schooners arrived at Montreal from Quebec loaded with flower which must certainly denote a very great scarcity. for the most of the supplies for that place are in time of plenty carried from hence. This day dined at Madam Lestorshes, supped at a Gentleman house near the same place
- 15 Le rose a frenchman who lately came from Albany, came to visit us, gave us an account of two negroes being taken at a place called Canterbury on Stornack river one of which he saw at Crownpoint. bought by the commander of said fort for four hundred Diers. The other made his escape the first night after he was taken. He also informed us that he saw eight Indians set off from thence for war, who told him that they designed for some of the English settlements for if they must fight the English they would not go so far. they looked upon them to be all of one ~~nation~~ people

1. The first thing I should mention is that the weather was very pleasant today. We went for a walk in the park and saw many beautiful flowers. The children were very happy and played for hours. We also had a picnic under a big tree. The food was delicious and everyone enjoyed it. We spent a very nice day and will be back soon.

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June 16 1782. It thundered and rained a small matter in the morning. Mr Wheelwright set off for Quebec about twelve o'clock with Mr Deplase the High Sheriff. We have repeated accounts of the Two Ours Indians doing upon the french traders in the westward which put the in Montreal into consternation. There is nothing that can ~~disturb~~ ^{hurt} the Country so much as to distress the trade in those parts for their income from thence seems to be the dependence of the whole country. Past numbers are employed in that business. We are told that two hundred of large birch canoes and batteaus have gone up the river this spring some five or six men each so that upwards of a thousand men are already gone upon that business.

Their method of carrying on said trade is for the chief traders or factors to remain in that country for three or four years and have supplies sent them yearly it is said that some of these traders go 3,000 miles but their supplies are not sent so far they go no farther than some of the french forts that are in those parts so these rambblers are obliged to return once a year to said forts for a new supply. Could our people be so well spirited in time of war as to go and destroy those forts it must in a short time impoverish Canada that they must fall an easy into our hands

7 a soldier was shot for deserting from some of the french forts in the west. This day I received a letter from Mr Hancock a prisoner at St Francis taken from Chetuoto.

18. It thundered and rained a small matter but the drouth is very great. The wheat in this country suffers very much. There is intelligence from Quebec that several vessels have arrived there from France loaded with flower and pork

19 I received a letter from the Missionary of St Francis and another from the above mentioned woman a number of Indians came to town at night tis said that they have brought two scalps & two prisoners but it wants confirmations

20 I went round the town to find a good gun. The scalps above mentioned were brought from the west and it is said that they are Indian scalps

- June 21st Sabbath day hot and dry
- 22nd. A number of the chiefs of the St Francis Indians came to Montreal & shewed me the respect as to come the same day and pay me a visit
- 23rd After dinner the Governor sent for me to appear before him and his council to receive a message from the chiefs of the St Francis Indians I accordingly did and after there spokesman had made his speech he delivered me a large belt of wampum which he said that I must deliver with his message to the Governor at Boston The same day I gave my old Indian a hat price ten silver he being one of the chiefs above mentioned
- 24th I sent a letter to one of the at St Francis by an Indian
- 25th I had a hint from an Indian as if a belt of wampum was come into this country from some of the six nations in order for a treaty with some or all the tribes of Indians here. There are numbers of the tribes of Indians coming to Montreal every few days The drought is now very extraordinary, the wheat in this country it is thought has received so much damage already that a crop cannot be expected this year and as they had but a very small crop last year the calamity of this country must certainly in a little time be very great
- 26th Something likely for rain but very hot and dry
- 27th A small matter of rain fell in the morning in the afternoon windy and dry. The great probability of a scarcity caused a sadness in all faces. in the evening it clouded up and bid fair for rain but broke away with but a small sprinkling
- 28th Sabbath day and kept as a day of rejoicing them for the birth of a young prince borne in France they have lately had news of. they went in procession and fired all their cannon viz. 33 in number
A black cloud came up at night but no rains
- 29th I paid my respects to the Governor he informed me of a great difficulty at Chebucto but did not let me know what it was about
- 30th 4 large bark canoes containing nine or ten Indians each

came to Montreal. It is said that these Indians place of abode is 1800 miles from hence. There came also a batteau with nine or ten Frenchmen to town from a French fort west of our English Government 900 miles; from thence they brought with them an Englishman who deserted from some of our Indian traders from Philadelphia his name is Jonathan Cafavour. There also came 4 canoes from Albany.

July 1st 1752. A large number of Indians came to town from Becanco an Indian town on the south side of the great River near Three Rivers. This day a number of women came to the Commissary for bread and upon his refusing to let them have any one of them took him by the throat. Exceeding hot and dry weather.

2nd. I received a letter from Mr Wheelwright at Quebec informing of his speedy arrival. At Montreal the weather is ^{but} exceedingly hot.

3rd. Mr Wheelwright returned from Montreal from Quebec brought with him two men taken at New Meadows last Summer. Great numbers of Indians are daily coming to town to receive their presents from their fathers as they term it.

4th. Two of the Ottawa Indians being almost drunk fell out to such a degree that one stabbed the other with his knife so that he expired in a few minutes. An old Indian that sat by and saw the action ordered a lad of about 14 or 15 years of age (being a near relative of him who was stabbed) to charge his gun and be ready to kill the other as soon as the first was dead. The boy accordingly did it with deliberation. The French people that were standing by told the murderer to make his escape he moved off slowly. The boy stood with his gun in his hand till his kinsman was quite gone and as soon as he saw him fetch his last breath he went after the other with as much calmness as if he was in pursuit of some game. When the murderer saw the lad after him he endeavoured to hide himself but the boy was so lucky as to see him lie down in a piece of wheat. The boy went as near as he thought necessary

and then fired and gave him a mortal wound but he retained so much strength that he got up and pursued the boy but not far. The old Indian that gave the boy his orders seeing that he was not killed but right ran with his knife and gave him several stabs so that he died immediately. So in half an hours time they were both ~~killed~~ dead. this was transacted just without the walls of Montreal

- by 5. Two prisoners were brought to town from St Francis viz. Seth Webb & Amos Eastman. we bought them at 300 livers each and ten livers each for the charge of bringing them to Montreal.
6. I received a letter from the missionary of St Francis
7. Mrs. Honor Hancock a prisoner taken from Sebucto was brought to Montreal whom we bought at 300 livers and 30 livers for the charge of bringing her here
8. Mr Wheelwright and I went to visit a captive girl named Elisabeth Cody she lived in the hospital south of the town
9. A great number of the St Francis Indians came to Montreal and brought with them some of our captive boys. There came up a smart thunder shower at night and for about half an hour it rained hard so that the water ran in brooks in the streets
10. Mr Wheelwright and I paid our respects to the Governor in the morning after noon I bought 2 guns price 67 livers each of which Mr Wheelwright paid 66 livers 15 s^{ts}. The heat increases very much
11. an exceeding hot day being by the river side I saw the French people digging out of the bank ice which was hove up in the winter and covered by the banks falling down upon it. They use this ice to preserve their fresh meat
2. Sabbath day hot and dry clouds of smoke are rising in all parts of this country - a surprising sight at this time of year. 2 small barks arrived from Quebec. I this day saw a man in his name was Johnson and that he

1. The first thing I noticed when I stepped out of the train was the cold air. It felt like a giant hand reaching out to grab me. I shivered and pulled my coat tighter around me. The train had been so warm and cozy, and now I was out in the open.
2. I looked around and saw a lot of people. Some were standing, some were sitting on benches. They all looked like they were waiting for something. I didn't know what, but I felt like I was part of a crowd.
3. The train started moving again. It was a bit jumpy at first, but then it got into a steady rhythm. I looked out the window and saw the city streets. They were so busy and full of life. I felt like I was in the middle of something big.
4. I saw a lot of people walking. Some were in a hurry, some were taking their time. I saw a man in a suit walking with a briefcase. I saw a woman in a dress walking with a shopping bag. I saw a lot of different people, all going about their business.
5. I saw a lot of buildings. They were so tall and so many. I felt like I was in a giant city. I saw a lot of different styles of buildings, from old to new. I saw a lot of different colors, from red to blue.
6. I saw a lot of cars. They were so many and so different. I saw a lot of different makes and models. I saw a lot of different colors, from black to white. I saw a lot of different people driving them.
7. I saw a lot of trees. They were so tall and so green. I felt like I was in a forest. I saw a lot of different kinds of trees, from oak to pine. I saw a lot of different leaves, from green to yellow.
8. I saw a lot of flowers. They were so many and so colorful. I felt like I was in a garden. I saw a lot of different kinds of flowers, from roses to tulips. I saw a lot of different colors, from red to blue.
9. I saw a lot of people. They were so many and so different. I felt like I was in a crowd. I saw a lot of different kinds of people, from young to old. I saw a lot of different people, all going about their business.
10. I saw a lot of things. They were so many and so different. I felt like I was in a world. I saw a lot of different kinds of things, from big to small. I saw a lot of different things, all going about their business.
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had an uncle in Boston named George Johnson and a kinsman, one ~~Wm~~ Thompson. His father he says lives in Edinburg Scotland and is a man of note.

July 13 Mr Wheeler Wright and my self went before the Governour with a Dutch girl taken in war named Elizabeth Cady and an English boy named Solomon Mitchel 12 years old taken about one year ago. Upon their refusing to go home the Governour would not give them up. The same day John Starks was brought to town by his Indian master he was taken a hunting this spring. He was given up to us for an Indian pony in his place for which we paid 515 livres.

14 We took our leave of the Governour and the rest of the chief officers and made all things ready for our return to New England.

15 We set out from Montreal for New England brought with us eight prisoners viz. 2 from Sebucta, Thomas and Honor Hancock. 2 men from New Hampshire Amos Eastman & John Stark taken a hunting. - Joseph taken west of Pennsylvania. From Massachusetts Edmund Henshley Samuel Lambert & Seth Webb. we came this day to Laprara, it rained a smart shower as we crossed the river & some in the night.

16 Set out from thence & came to St Johns - our baggage was brought in carts. an officer is sent with us who is ordered to conduct us to the first English land. We remained at St. Johns until 5 o'clock PM. then set out with a batteau and a bark canoe. came 18 miles and lodged.

17 Embarked very early in the morning. came about 45 miles.

met several canoes from Albany it rained some showers.

18 Embarked early in the morning wind at head and some rain we came to the mouth of the Otter Creek and turned a shore to lodge but the small flies were so plenty that we could not sleep. we embarked again about 2 at night wind in the northeast and some hard showers of rain. we hoisted sail and came to Crown Point about sunrise. I would note that my old Indian master came in the canoe with me and that the greater part of the St Francis Indians have left their town for want of provision and are on the road to the Dutch Settlement. We remained at Crownpoint all day.

being Sabbath day, the wind blew hard all day but we could not prevail with the Indians to go with us being none here but of the St Francis tribe, the negro which the Commander of the fort bought of the Indians, taken from Canterbury we cannot get for the same money we suppose he bought him for the Gentleman he gave 600 livres for him. we have been informed that he gave but 400 The Captain Lady told us that she was offered him for that money

- 20 The Indians we had agreed with ~~us~~ to go with us to Lyders failing us and not coming obliged us to remain at the fort all day. just at night I agreed with two other Indians so that Mr Wheelwright & 5 of our people set off at sun set I that rest lodged at the fort
- 21 I with the people left with me set off from Crownpoint at 10 in the morning accompanied by an officer and 4 Souldiers who brought us in 2 log canoes we came all night up the land arrived at the carrying place at the west end of the great bay west of the mouth of wood creek at Eight the next morning we slept and refreshed ourselves till two after noon then bound up our packs and set forward came about one mile & passed by a family of Indians came seven miles and encamped
- 23 In the morning I misd my sword which I had left at the place where we first took up our packs; sent two men back they found it with the Indians above mentioned. We came this day to Col. Lyders met with Mr Wheelwright who came by the way of the Lake St. Sacrament. he was obliged to leave the canoe and loading on the carrying place. the Indians leaving him he came to Lyders for help
- 24 I went with Lyders son & three horses to assist in getting our baggage to Hudson river I hired two Mohawks to carry the canoe. Brought our things to the river. & returned to Lyders that night met great numbers of the St Francis Indians coming to Albany with beaver
- 25 Came from Lyders to Saratoga & lodged at Mrs. Kelbions place came this far with us for which we paid them six dollars

July 26 1752 Sabbath day Mr Wheelwright and his man came on horse back to Albany I with the canoe and the rest of our people came within 10 miles of Albany and paid three dollars for the carrying our things by the bad water

27 Came to Albany about noon remained there the rest of the day

28 I remained at Albany upon the desire of a number of the St Francis Indians who this day had a sort of a treaty with the Dutch traders they met at 10 in the fore noon made a small speech to the Dutch in which they manifested a great desire for peace. then delivered a belt of wampum & a pack of beaver. The Dutch desired their attendance at three P.M. They accordingly met when the Dutch made their speech in which they gave them free liberty to come and trade without molestation & that the road way open. Then made them a present of a belt of wampum & two, two kegs of powder tobacco &c. The Indians received them thankfully.

29 - I set out from Albany with my son. Came to the first house on Hoosue River and lodged at Mrs Heywoods. & the 7 prisoners who came on the day before lodged at fort Massachusetts

30 - I came to Capt Rice's where I overtook the above said men. Here we all lodged

31 - Came to Deerfield and lodged

Aug 1st I sent an express to Boston with the letters which came from Canada. And four of the prisoners went down the Country road for home. Three of which belonged to the Eastwards. The other at Abuto. I came with the rest of the people to Northfield

2nd Lord's day Went to meeting. After meeting I came to Hinsdale fort with my son & Joseph

Came with my son to No 2. Left with Col. Hensdell. William Heywood remained at Northfield to hunt for his horse which left him at the carrying place

Came to No 4. Found my family all well. my wheat all reaped

a paper was drawn up & signed for me to go to New Hampshire - Aug - 9. Lords day - 10th a day of rain - I prepared for my journey - 11th I set out for Portsmouth. Came to Col Hensdell's Fort. 12 Stopped

the greater part of the day at said Fort to get my Linens washed. Came to Northfield at night.

went to Deerfield to get my clothes. & returned same day to Winchester where I met Capt Hubbard

we lodged at Major Willards. 14th we came to Esq. Canada's & lodged at Col Berry's house;

it rained the most of the day. 15. to Lunenburg

Lords day. 17. Hubbard & I in company with Mr

Bellows came to Col. Blanchards at Dunstable

& lodged - 18 after dinner, I set out from

thence & came to Chester & lodged at Capt Dolford

19. Said Capt set out with me - Came to Portsmouth

I remained there till the 24 in which time I lodged a petition with the Governor & Council for

25. Came to Boston by way of Cambridge & Roxbury
26. at Boston lodged with Mr Lyman -
27. I let from Boston & came as far as
Marlborough - 28 to Rutland - 29 at Rutland
30 Lords day. 31. came from Rutland to
Hardwick; Sept 1. came to Hatfield - 2
to Deerfield. bought a trunk of Major Hindsdale
in which I put my clothes & sent them to
Northfield. The next day which according
to act of Parliament is the 14 - I came to
Col Hindsdale's fort. - It rained some.
15. I came to Kilbuck at fort to 3. lodged
16 Home to do 4. 17. Lords day: from the 18
to the 23, exceedingly dry weather. The great
River is thought to be as low as has been
known there many years past - Some
of our people are gone down to Deerfield
& Hatfield this week - viz Doct Hartung,
& wife Joseph Willard & Solomon Hartung,
wife - Thomas Putnam & Isaac Parker.
Ran came with a canoe of salt. Joseph
& Wadsworth was out of the fort this week. I
this week began to fall timber for a house.
24 Sabbath day. 25 - I sawed timber for clapboard
- a great supply of rain at night.
The water stood in puddles next morning.
26 rained part of the day, 27. hard.
froze at night. 28 Began to make a road at
the south end of my house lot. Ebenezer
Putnam & his brother Laberce set out on

a journey 29. I finished the above said road.
the whole cost me above seven days work.
30. It rained ^{hard} in afternoon. Oct 1 Lord's day. Stephen
Farnsworth had an ox killed by the fall of a tree.
2^d. Wright had a barrel of rum brought to the
fort. I bought a three acre lot of Joseph
Wood. 3^d Elijah Groat left me & set out
for home. 4. I fell timber &c. 5th. I began to hew
timber for my home. 6th I gathered my corn
7. I carted my corn. 8 Sabbath day & rained
hard all day. 9th Storm continued. 10th At
husking pleasant weather, but clouded up at
night & bid fair for more rain. 11. It
rained most of the day. 12 finished husking &
sorting my corn. 13. It rained part of the
day. it is now a very wet season. 14. Lieut.
Bellow came to No 4. 15 Sabbath day. 16. I fell
timber &c. 17. Stephen Daily came to town.
18. I hewed timber with six scorers. The boat
came to the falls with salt rum, &c.
19. hewed timber with 8 scorers. 20th hewed with
six. Doct. Hastings & wife returned home.
Ruth Parker came home 21. hewed with 6 hands
22 Sabbath day. 23. hewed with six. do. On
people are yet busy at harvesting. 24 five hands
hewing. 25 do. This day two barrels rum brought
to the fort. 26. Rained hard most of the day.
27. 4 hands at scoring - drew part of the timber.

three at scoring. afternoon the carpenters
went home. - 29 Sabbath

October 29th (1752) Sabbath day. 30th I drove my
hay out of the Great meadows. our cattle are now
all let into the meadows. 31th There fell a small snow
in the morning about two inches deep but went off
before night. November 1st 2nd & 3rd I drove timber
for my house &c. fine pleasant weather we are
now set out for Martins 4th fine weather.
5th Sabbath day very rainy for the season I had
a cow calve. 6th drove timber &c. 7th Davis came
in the morning father Henry with him began to
frame my house the same day 8th framing. Deacon
Adams & family came to work. 9th framing -
Lieutenant Johnsons wife was brought to bed of
a daughter. 10th 11th framing. this day a number
of men from Woodstock came to work. 11th framing
it rained obliged us to lay off afternoon out
framing. began to raise the sides of the house
12th Lords day our people begin to assemble together
for the worship of god 13th framing the lower part
of the house is almost up. 14th framing. a small snow
fell at night. 15th I began to raise my house. 16th
I finished. Wheeler & Mr. ~~Stetson~~ Stetman raised
the same day. Davis & Henry went home. 17th & 18th

B. Short description of the City of Montreal in Canada
Ter It is built on the south side of a great Island
called the Island of Montreal. This Island is said to be
fifteen leagues in length and — in breadth. Called

they own the greater part of the land. the City is about
three fourths of a mile in length and about ~~the~~ one
one hundred rods wide in the widest place
It stands on the side of St Laurence River
I measured some with a wall 16. or 18 feet
high. the wall on the river side stands about
three rods from high water mark. the town lies
upon a descent of land. so as that from the water
side to the upper part or north westerly side
of town is up hill but not very steep. there is but
two Streets that go through the length of the town
and so about nine or ten cross Streets. This town contains
about 400 dwelling houses besides Public Buildings
There is five Chapels or Churches viz one for the

Bone foot Friars. One for the close ~~view~~ ^{view} to which
joins ~~the~~ The Hospital. One do for the holy sisters. ~~and~~
~~one for the holy sisters~~ and one for the Jesuits one
one which is called the Great Church where the
Priests say Mass. There is one more yet without
the wall on the south side joining to the Kings
Hospital. W B, The walls of the City are not so
wide at the north end as at the south part the
north one about 30 rods wide. here is the
Battery on a neck of land which commands all
the City - (the end)
