All is well at home and Jim and I are just fine. To-day was a lovely Spring day and Jim and I took a walk to Thelma's hotel. Maurice and Thelma are fine and expect to go to Atlantic City this coming Wednesday afternoon. Thelma received your letter and expects to answer it soon. After our lunch, your mother, father and Uncle Harry came to visit us. My sister Eleanor called, too, and joined us soon after. Uncle Harry and the folks are well and we showed each other all those recent snapshots of you and Joe. I also read Joe's letter to Harry and now have an idea of where you are and to-night I looked up the population of the town. Last census taken showed 60,000 inhabitants. Also read your letter to Uncle Harry and we're all glad you and Joe are in non-combat service. I do hope that Joe writes Uncle Harry often and not be so ashamed of his letter writing. In your next letter please send me Joe's address as I have his London address at home.

to amuse himself while Eleanor and I talk.

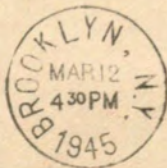
War news is still very good and to-night I
